Play to Learn

The Southeast Kansas Library System received a \$162,000 grant from the Kansas Children's Cabinet and Trust Fund through the Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention (CBCAP) Program. Starting in October 2021, Iola Public piloted the first year of the 3-year Family Engagement in Public Libraries project. The grant funded play-based programs to connect families to community services, a new parenting collection and catalog kiosk, Family Place Libraries™ training, the Grow Your Brain play space. and coaching with Tammie Benham, the System's Youth Services Consultant. Over 2,000 visitors played in the new space.
